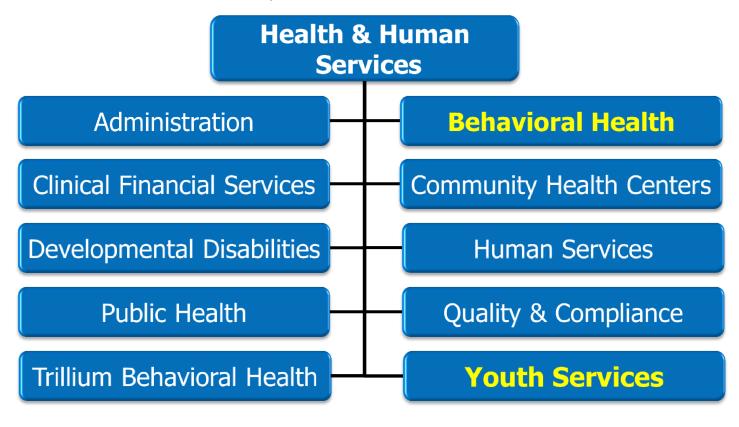

Current Year Budget Changes

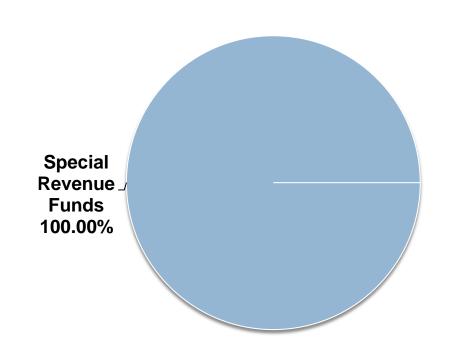
Since FY 17-18 Budget Adoption, the following changes to the Department budget have occurred:

- New Division of Quality & Compliance
- Additional FTE
 - 17/18 Adopted = 573.38
 - 18/19 Proposed = 613.60
 - Increase of 40.22 FTE (10.5 FTE in Behavioral Health)

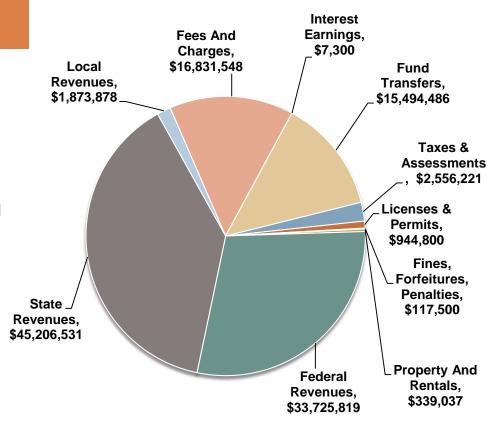

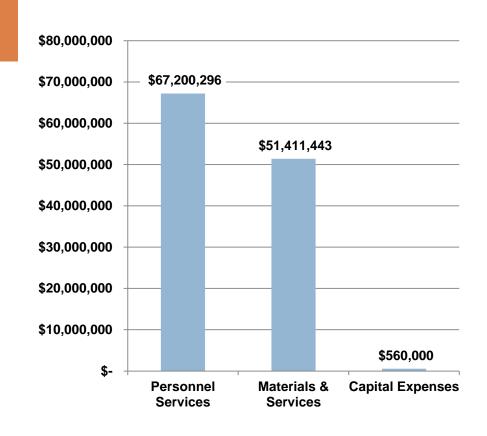

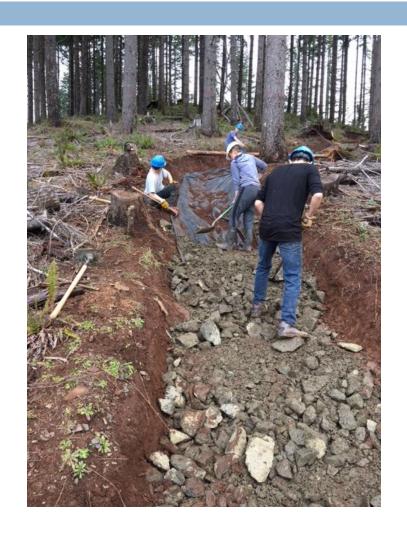

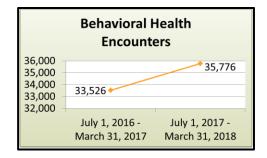
