#### LANE COUNTY BUDGET COMMITTEE MEETING Wednesday, May 9, 2018 1:30 p.m. Board of Commissioner's Conference Room

Chair Hijmans asks what the uncollectable percentage is, and how it has changed over the past years. Ms. Urbatzka answers that it's usually about 90% of the current years' taxes, and that this hasn't changed much over the years.

Commissioner Farr asks what the FQHC evaluation results have been. Mr. Hjelm answers that they have fully passed on 91 of 92 areas.

Commissioner Farr asks what the partnerships with the City of Eugene and City of Springfield mean. Mr. Manela answers that it has been financial partnership, as well as assisting in policies. They also discuss housing/shelter issues, including lack of beds.

Mr. Abel asks if the quality and compliance asks are in the proposed budget. Ms. Gaffney answers that the general fund ask is a small part of the total costs that will be picked up.

Mr. Abel wants to know if Medicare's new per member billing will effect revenue. Mr. Hjelm answers that they have calculated this budget to be revenue neutral. Many have seen a net benefit as a cash flow change and the payment model of a team based approach allows for providers to see more patients.

Mr. Stoneburg asks if we are higher in STD's than average. Dr. Luedtke answers that we are higher than the rest of the state in many areas, but that there are other cities in the US that we are on par with. A focus is on education for the providers.

Mr. Abel asks about the State payback for match funds. Ms. Warren answers that there is a need for a local match. In addition the number has gone up because the billing has changed as well.

Mr. Abel asks about the large decrease in agency payments with Trillium Behavioral Health. Ms. Kjolberg answers that they are bringing budget and actuals closer together and with that they were able to put more money into reserves. Ms. Gaffney also added that if they aren't going to spend funds in the upcoming year, they have moved those into reserves.

Chair Hijmans brings up his concern about mass shootings and screenings for that. Ms. Gaffney answers that there has been an increase in awareness in general about this amongst police as well as staff.
