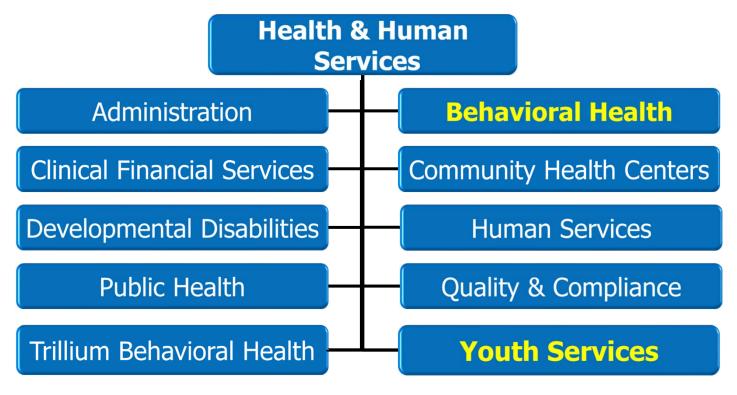

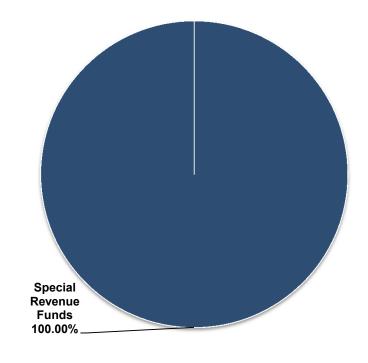

Total Operating Budget \$128,319,432

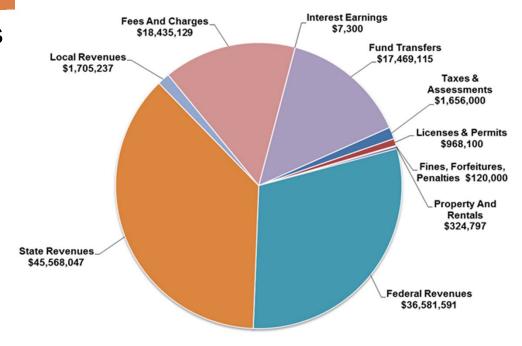


FY 19-20 Budget Details

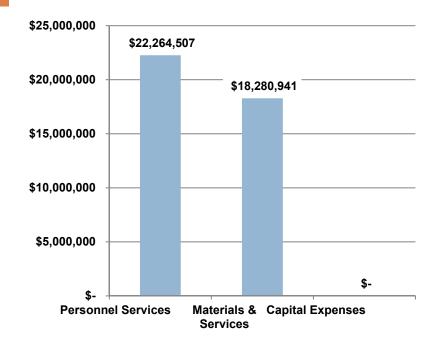




FY 19-20 Budget Details

19-20 EXPENDITURES

- No significant changes in FTE or expenditures.
- Capital for BH expansion of clinic size and restructure the lobby area.
- YS Public Safety revenue decreased 35%.

- Building stronger continuum of diversion programming

- Taking appropriate steps to keep youth from collateral consequences of system involvement
- Committing to limited and constructive use of rules and sanctions and minimized use of confinement

Unique Clients/Patients receiving services increased 28%

Community Service increased 20%

291 Youth will have attended the Impacts of Crime class



Number of Encounters increased 23%





Future Challenges & Opportunities

- Increasing community based diversion opportunities for youth
- Youth Services' detention pod needs new paint to create a safe environment for youth
- Homeless/runaway youth shelter
- Rural areas in Lane County need clinical behavioral health services
- Mental health crisis and substance abuse treatment
