II. ISSUE OR PROBLEM

Board action is required to approve the Community Corrections Plan.

II. DISCUSSION

A. Background/Analysis

Per Oregon Revised Statutes 423.475 to 423.565, Lane County shares responsibility with the Oregon State Department of Corrections for community-based supervision, sanctions and services for offenders convicted of felonies who are:

- (a) On parole;
- (b) On probation;
- (c) On post-prison supervision;
- (d) Sentenced, on or after January 1, 1997, to twelve months or less incarceration; and
- (e) Sanctioned, on or after January 1, 1997, by Lane County Community Corrections, a court or the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision to more than thirty days but less than twelve months as a sanction for violation of a condition of parole, probation or post-prison supervision.

The Department of Corrections makes grants to assist counties in the implementation and operation of community corrections. To receive this funding, Lane County must submit a Community Corrections Plan (CCP) consisting of program descriptions and a budget summary. The CCP must provide for the management of adult felony offenders under supervision and the housing and programming of offenders sentenced

to twelve months or less incarceration. The CCP is designed to accomplish the performance outcomes in the IGA, meet mandates of evidence based practices and meet local priorities and needs.

On November 6, 2002 the Board of County Commissioners adopted an order forming the Supervisory Authority Team (SAT). The SAT is currently comprised of Captain Kevin Williams, Lane County Sheriff's Office; Linda Eaton, Director of Community Corrections; and, Judge Karsten Rasmussen. One of the SAT's tasks is to develop the County's biennial CCP and budget.

On May 26, 2005, the SAT presented their recommendation to the Public Safety Coordinating Council (PSCC). The recommendation was made based on the governor's recommended budget, which has a 5% cut over 04/05 funding. The actual budget has not yet been passed by the legislature.

The SAT recommends support of the same services in 05-06 as 04-05 with two small increases. Support of the CCP set forward is possible because of \$914,363 in CCA funds received and unspent last biennium that have been carried forward in the Department of Health & Human Service budget into this biennium. In addition, CCA supports for the services provided by the Sheriff have been reduced in the first year of the budget to absorb the entire anticipated biennial reduction.

The two small funding increases to services are; transitional housing and alcohol/drug addiction outpatient treatment.

Sponsors, the transitional housing contractor, has a two-year federal grant ending January 2006. Without additional funding, \$84,998, the community would lose 18 transitional beds.

An additional \$40,000 is also being added for outpatient alcohol and drug treatment services for offenders. This will purchase twenty-six more outpatient treatment slots from Emergence (formerly ACES), the selected contractor.

The SAT also recommended that if the legislature approves a budget that looks significantly different from the governor's proposed budget, the SAT review the second year of the budget in the fall.



SUPERVISION PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Program Name: Community Supervision - Lane County Parole & Probation

Program Purpose:

The goals of community supervision are to reduce recidivism, enforce supervisory authority orders, assist offenders to change behavior, provide reparation to victims, and provide for sanctions when offenders violate supervision. The program purpose includes other required functions on behalf of the State, such as conducting pre-sentence investigations for Circuit Court sentencing decisions, and investigating and supervising offenders from other states, through Oregon's participation in the Interstate Compact.

Program Description:

General Supervision: Offenders receive supervision appropriate for their risk level, and are assigned to caseloads based on geography (residence) or case type. Program policy emphasizes the supervision of high and medium risk offenders.

Neighborhood-Based Supervision Program: Parole & Probation provides community-based supervision in several ways. Nineteen Parole/Probation officers have full-time offices located in city police departments (Eugene, Florence, Junction City), Housing Authority offices, Sponsors housing, and the County sex offender treatment program. Additional officers have part-time space available (Veneta, Cottage Grove, Oakridge), or are otherwise assigned to a geographic location in the county. This specialization allows officers to develop close partnerships with local law enforcement and treatment agencies.

<u>Limited Supervision:</u> Lower risk offenders are supervised at a limited, or casebank, level. Parole/probation officers keep these cases on their caseloads, in order to respond if the offender becomes involved with law enforcement, or if other circumstances cause their risk level to increase. In many cases, attempts are made to transfer supervision to the courts, or to terminate supervision early.

<u>Sex Offender Supervision:</u> Offenders with sex offense convictions are supervised by officers with specialized training. Two risk assessment tools specific to sex offenders are used to determine supervision level, and to determine predatory designation. Community notification occurs on some predatory offenders. General supervision methods are supplemented with other tools, including polygraphs, specialized treatment programs, and collaboration with victims, victim advocates, and child protective services.

<u>Domestic Violence Offender Supervision:</u> Domestic violence offenders also receive specialized supervision, which also includes working with specialized intervention programs, and collaboration with victims, victim advocates, and child protective services. Many of these offenses are misdemeanors.

<u>Pre-sentence Investigations:</u> Preparation of reports containing scope of crime, criminal and social history information, victim(s) statement, medical/psychological information, sentencing guidelines computations, and recommended sentence.

<u>Hearings/Sanctions</u>: Parole/Probation Officers or Hearings Officers impose intermediate sanctions when offenders violate supervision conditions. This includes providing offenders written notice of the alleged violations, as well as notice of their rights to a hearing before a sanction is imposed. If necessary, the PO or Hearings Officer conducts a hearing, representing either the Parole Board or the Local Supervisory Authority.

Program Objectives:

The program objectives are to meet the goals included in the Intergovernmental Agreement between the County and the State. Those include: reducing new felony convictions for supervised offenders; enforcing court and other supervisory authority orders; assisting offenders to increase/maintain employment and treatment participation; and enforcing reparation to victims through payment of restitution and compensatory fines, and completing required hours of community service.

Method(s) of Evaluation:

A variety of sources are used to determine the extent to which Lane County is achieving the objectives for community corrections. These include reports from the Department of Corrections (DOC) Corrections Information System (CIS), local extracts of data from the CIS, OJIN data, and local agency data and reports.
