IV. COMMITTEE CHARGE

Advise the Board of County Commissioners on the status of civil and human rights in the County, and provide the Board of County Commissioners and County departments community input and feedback regarding human rights and affirmative action; provide community education and outreach concerning human rights programs within Lane County; recommend, support, and assist in development of programs and seminars on human rights, cultural diversity, equal opportunity, and affirmative action; develop and publicize a system to assist persons in seeking resolution of harassment and discrimination complaints and recommend appropriate action; recommend policies and actions to improve access to County services and employment opportunities, and for overcoming cultural, linguistic and physical barriers which limit accessibility; provide an annual report to the Board of County Commissioners on the progress and condition of human rights in Lane County (including past activities, future goals and the number, type, and resolution of complaints); hold at least three (3) Commission meetings outside the Eugene/Springfield area utilizing city council meetings, community forums, and joint meetings with the Commissioner of the District in which the meetings are held; develop a work plan annually for the upcoming year; affirm, encourage, and promote programs and services designed to effectuate the spirit and intent of laws prohibiting discrimination and that recognize and value the cultural diversity of Lane County.

V. BACKGROUND

In July, 2006, the County Administrator was directed to evaluate and bring back a recommendation to the Board regarding the County's Human Rights Advisory Committee and its role, duties, reporting relationship and staffing. A task force was created to make recommendations to the County Administrator.

The task force believed strongly that the protection of human rights is a primary responsibility of the County, based on the inalienable rights and inherent worth of all people. Human rights abuses do occur in this county and can hinder access to County services and community participation for vulnerable individuals. Therefore, the task force recommended that the advisory committee be reconstituted to support and oversee the advancement of human rights in Lane County and that the name be changed to the Lane County Commission for the Advancement of Human Rights.

The Lane County Commission for the Advancement of Human Rights should have a

fundamental role in County government, being highly visible, easily accessible and centrally located, in order to best advise the commissioners, educate the public and effectively address complaints. In addition, in order to emphasize the value of human rights to the organization, human rights criteria should be applied to all budget decisions. Care was taken in the recruitment so that it can effectively represent the diversity and geography of the county, be highly effective as an advisory body to the Lane County Board of Commissioners and foster the advancement of human rights in our communities.

The vacancies were advertised from April 4, 2008 to May 2, 2008.

At the close of the advertisement period, eleven completed applications were received. Seven At Large applicants met criteria minimums and were interviewed. Board of Commissioners appointees were not required to attend an interview. The Board Order creating the Commission specified criteria for the various appointments. For Commissioner appointees: After requesting nominees from within their respective district to city officials, including mayors and other community members, each County Commissioner appoints one member to represent the Commissioner's district, with that appointee residing within the Commissioner's district whenever possible. Each Commissioner appointee is expected to report back to the appointing Commissioner to help keep lines of communication open between the Board and the LCCAHR. In addition, the order specified for all appointees to meet the following criteria:

- (a) Agreement with the Mission of the LCCAHR
- (b) Ability to attend the meetings
- (c) Experience and expertise in human rights and/or community relations
- (d) Group process and conflict resolution training, skills and experience
- (e) Special sensitivity to marginalized groups
- (f) Preference given to candidates who represent minority communities, protected classes or other groups subject to human rights abuses

The application and interview process revealed that the applicants recommended for appointment appear to meet these criteria.

WHEREAS, this matter having been fully considered by the Lane County Board of County Commissioners.






1. Give a brief description of the experience and training that qualifies you for membership on this advisory committee.

I am a vibrant, bi-racial educator who enjoys participating in active committees that carry a vision of institutional transformation and community development. We are part of a great story and we can choose to add to the divisions between people or be a part of weaving respectful relations with all life. This committee offers the engaging opportunity to facilitate how the construction of difference and human rights are taken up in ways that inspire more harmonious relationships, equality and balance. I have dedicated my life to this purpose.

My professional history concerns studying, advocating for and engaging institutionally disadvantaged people in educational and social services that support their achievement, health, and empowerment. My primary qualifications for this position include Doctoral Candidacy in the Cultural Foundations of Education (dissertation draft complete), Masters Degree in the Cultural Foundations of Education, Syracuse University, and Masters Degree in Counseling Psychology, University of Oregon. I focused my graduate studies upon institutional discrimination in education and cultural constructions of difference, and multicultural education and counseling. As a former Special Education Teacher, I also was greatly affected by members in the CFE Department, including Dr. Doug Biklen and Dr. Steven Taylor who write against ways people with disabilities have been poorly socially constructed., and for a different world. While at the University of Oregon, I was the first Coordinator of the MultiCultural Center, supervised work-study staff and managed a \$200,000 budget. Among other things, I initiated and facilitated ongoing educational programs such as the Color of Fear video series and the Women of Color Support Group.

I have graduate and undergraduate teaching experience. I currently teach "Clinical Work with Diverse Populations" in the Graduate School at Lewis & Clark College and I taught "Race, class and gender in educational structures" in Syracuse University's Graduate School. I am the former principal of Northwest Youth Corps OutDoor High School, having the highest percentage of students of color. I also taught for 5 years in a persistence-focused Women's Program at LCC. This program assists primarily low-income women in Career and Life Planning and coping with Life Transitions. It has a similar mission to the University of Oregon's Office of Multicultural Academic Support. All of my publications, presentations and workshops concern issues of difference, power and education, including "Recentering Multiculturalism: Moving Toward Community" in the *Journal of Urban Education* with Dr. Banister. This work outlines how popular notions of multiculturalism often unwittingly reinscribe racism against the good intentions of teachers. Dr. Banister and I wrote this article for teacher educators who are looking for educational materials to use in their classroom. At Syracuse, I was a University Supervisor of student teachers in the Inclusive Teacher Education Program, coordinated the School of Education Group for the Study of Gender, Difference and Education, and Schools and University Partnerships for Educational Responsibility. Last, I am a former special education teacher and have a particular interest in helping support a cultural shift where people labeled "disabled" are fully accommodated and are seen as full human beings.

2. Why do you want to become a member of this committee, & what specific contributions do you hope to make? We have inherited the current social and institutional structures that we work and live within. While these structures are not static, they are sometimes easy to be seen as "how it has always been." Such structures can be accepted without a thoughtful way of critically thinking about what benefits there would be if it was otherwise. One of my areas is institutionalized racism in education. From this work I have come to understand how institutions of education, sometimes contrary to the good intentions of teachers and administrators, unwittingly reproduce discrimination on the basis of race, class, gender, ability and sexuality. I intend to bring my skills in this regard to this committee and to be utilized well on this committee.



I have lived in Eugene for 15 years. From my perspective, there are inadequate opportunities for members of CONTY this community to understand the overt, and subtle impediments to human rights and a more freathy way of community life. I would like to see more opportunities in this area. It is very important to me that the climate in which I live is safe, welcoming and buildings bridges to community.

- 3. List the community concerns related to this committee that you would like to see addressed. Here are some ideas that may be useful issues to address:
 - Create and maintain a welcoming climate for all people served in and in connection to Lane County, specifically looking at people who not privileged within the dominant (while diverse in itself) culture and therefore rarely have a strong collective voice or representation
 - Investigate and prepare for expected cultural differences (via training) and the impacts different ways of looking at the world would impact the ability to gain, access, and receive services
 - Create opportunities to assess County relations with diverse people, cultures, & differential needs
 - Assist collaborations, programs and communication across difference
 - Investigate definitions, perspectives from which categories and definitions arise, policies and procedures for inclusivity, quality of service and protection
 - Generate opportunities for collaboration that build communities, listen to constituents' concerns, works through the conflicts that are bound to arise, and develop prevention plans
 - Investigate, assess, and dismantle institutionalized structures that unequally discriminate against groups the County states it supports, and
 - Investigate, create, and evaluate institutionalized structures intended to be balanced with regard to race, class, gender, ability, and sexuality differences.




