DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE (DOJ) AWARD IN THE AMOUNT OF \$500,000, DELEGATING AUTHORITY TO THE COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR TO SIGN GRANT DOCUMENTS, AND APPROPRIATING \$500,000 IN

REVENUE AND EXPENDITURES IN SPECIAL REVENUE

FUND 260, PUBLIC SAFETY

I. MOTION

Move to Accept a Department of Justice Award in the Amount of \$500,000 and to Delegate Authority To the County Administrator To Sign Grant Documents and to Appropriate \$500,000 in Revenue and Expenditures in Special Revenue Fund 260, Public Safety.

II. AGENDA ITEM SUMMARY

The Board is asked to accept a \$500,000 award from the Department of Justice and to delegate authority to the County Administrator to sign grant documents. In addition, the grant funds need to be appropriated in the Public Safety Special Revenue Fund.

III. BACKGROUND/IMPLICATIONS OF ACTION

A. Board Action and Other History

This grant is the result of the United Front federal advocacy effort for 2009. The Board approved the United Front priorities in January 2009, Board Order 09-1-28-20. Lane County Sheriff's Office requested and was awarded \$500,000 for Public Safety Equipment and Technology improvements. This is a collaborative effort with the City of Eugene. The City will receive funds to help equip a training

simulator at the Regional Training Center.

B. Policy Issues

Departments must seek Board approval of grant awards that exceed \$100,000.

C. Board Goals

This request is in keeping with Board's Strategic Direction to "pursue intergovernmental revenue".

D. Financial and/or Resource Considerations

This grant provides revenue to purchase and install security equipment at the jail. Grant funds will also fund staff training in the use of the new equipment. Radio docking stations will be installed in vehicles used by Probation Officers to improve communication with Dispatch while in the field. Other than the training associated with the new equipment, the grant provides no funding for personnel. The equipment to be purchased with grant funds was not scheduled for purchase or budgeted for. The grant allows the Sheriff's Office the ability to purchase modern technological equipment that would not have been possible without grant funds.

E. Analysis

Public Safety agencies in Lane County have a long history of collaboration in providing efficient and effective services to the public. Examples include a shared criminal justice/public safety database and Dispatch system and a shared, fully interoperable wide-area radio system. This grant request was another example of interagency partnership as it addressed issues that impact all law enforcement agencies in the county – training, security and officer safety.

There are three components to the proposal: 1) expand video surveillance and recording technology and perimeter security to improve safety of staff, inmates, and officers visiting the Lane County Adult Corrections complex, 2) integrate Parole and Probation officers into the regional interoperable radio system to increase the safety of the officers as they work in the community, and 3) further develop a regional command training and simulation center to provide an immersive, hands-on environment for training in incident command, emergency response, and disaster preparedness for regional law enforcement agencies.

The project will replace 75 existing cameras and add at least 35 additional cameras in and around the adult corrections facility complex. These cameras will pan, tilt, and zoom and will significantly increase observation throughout and around the facility. A RAID (Redundant Array of Independent Disks) system will triple the amount of electronic storage and memory capacity and meet state

guidelines to be able to recall information that is at least 30 days old. Staff will be trained in the use of the cameras and in the storage and retrieval of recorded images.

Gaps in the perimeter fence will be eliminated with additional fencing and razor wire and electronic security gates will be added. For increased safety of Probation Officers, radio docking stations will be installed in vehicles. In addition, this project will help equip a learning environment to train public safety responders in a realistic environment. The award provides the City of Eugene \$66,666.68 towards the development of a training simulator.

The following information is required prior to approval of grant applications:

1. What is the match requirement?

There is no match requirement.

2. Will the grant require expenditures for Material & Services or capital not fully paid by the grant?

The grant does not cover M&S. However, only a very small amount of the grant is for training and M&S costs associated with these costs can be covered by existing funds.

3. Will grant funds be fully expended before county funds need to be spent?

No

4. How will the administrative work of the grant be covered if grant funds don't cover it?

Sheriff's Office Fiscal staff will cover the required administrative work. The grant is for one-year only.

5. Have grant stakeholders been informed of the grant sun setting policy?

All participants are aware that this is a one-time, one-year grant award.

6.& 7. What accounting, auditing and evaluation obligations are imposed by the grant? Who will do it?

The grant requires the usual quarterly financial and programmatic reporting. The work will be handled by LCSO staff.

8. Are there restrictions against applying the county full cost indirect charge?

We did not request indirects as grant funds are being used to purchase equipment, not personnel.

9. Are there unique or unusual conditions that trigger additional county work effort or liability such as supplanting or indemnity obligations?

Grant funds must supplement existing local funds, not supplant. County funds cannot be diverted for other uses due to receipt of this award.

10. Grant involving technology issues require Information Services department review and approval prior to submission by the Board.

IS and LCSO staff are working on implementation and installation issues associated with receipt of the grant. It is important to complete acceptance of the grant award in a timely manner while these issues are resolved.

F. Alternatives/Options

- 1. Accept the DOJ Award in the amount of \$500,000.
- 2. Do not accept the DOJ Award.

IV. TIMING/IMPLEMENTATION

Upon Board approval, the County Administrator will sign the grant award documents. Once final approval is received, work on the various components of the grant can begin.

V. RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board accept the DOJ grant award in the amount of \$500,000.

Dear Mr. Spartz:

Congratulations on your recent award, in establishing financial assistance programs, Congress linked the receipt of Federal funding to compliance with Federal civil rights laws. The Office for Civil Rights (OCR), Office of Justice Programs (OIP), U.S. Department of Justice is responsible for ensuring that recipients of financial aid from OIP, its component offices and bureaus, the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW), and the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) comply with applicable Federal civil rights statutes and regulations. We at OCR are available to belp you and your organization meet the civil rights requirements that come with Justice Department funding.

Ensuring Access to Federally Assisted Programs

As you know, Federal laws prohibit recipients of financial assistance from discriminating on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, or disability in funded programs or activities, not only in respect to employment practices but also in the delivery of services or benefits. Federal law also prohibits funded programs or activities from discriminating on the basis of age in the delivery of services or benefits.

Providing Services to Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Individuals

In accordance with Department of fustice Guidance pertaining to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d, recipients of Federal financial assistance must take reasonable steps to provide meaningful access to their programs and activities for persons with limited English proficiency (LEP). For more information on the civil rights responsibilities that recipients have in providing language services to LEP individuals, please see the website at http://www.lep.gov.

Ensuring Equal Treatment for Fuith-Based Organizations

The Department of Instice has published a regulation specifically pertaining to the funding of faith-based organizations. In general, the regulation, Participation in Justice Department Programs by Religious Organizations; Providing for Equal Treatment of all Justice Department Program Participants, and known as the Equal Treatment Regulation 28 C.F.R. part 38, requires State Administering Agencies to treat these organizations the same as any other applicant or recipient. The regulation prohibits State Administration decisions on the basis of an organization's religious character or affiliation, religious name, or the religious composition of its board of directors.

The regulation also prohibits faith-based organizations from using financial assistance from the Department of Justice to fund inherently religious activities. While faith-based organizations can engage in non-funded inherently religious activities, they must be held separately from the Department of Justice funded programs, and conformers or beneficiaries cannot be compelled to participate in them. The Equal Treatment Regulation also makes clear that organizations participating in programs funded by the Department of Justice are not permitted to discriminate in the provision of services on the basis of a beneficiary's religion. State Administering Agencies and finith-based organizations should also note that the Safe Streets Act, as amended; the Victims of Crime Act, as amended; and the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act, as amended, contain prohibitions against discrimination on the basis of religion in employment. Despite these neediscrimination provisions, the Justice Department has concluded that the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) is reasonably construed, on a case-by-case basis, to require that its funding agencies permit faith-based organizations applying for funding under the applicable program statutes both to receive DOJ funds and to continue considering religion when hiring staff, even if the statute that authorizes the funding program generally forbids considering of religion in employment decisions by grantees.

Questions about the regulation or the application of RFRA to the statutes that prohibit discrimination in employment may be directed to this Office.

Enforcing Civil Rights Laws

All recipients of Federal financial assistance, regardless of the particular funding source, the amount of the grant award, or the number of employees in the workforce, are subject to the prohibitions against unlawful discrimination. Accordingly, OCR investigates recipients that are the subject of discrimination complaints from both individuals and groups. In addition, based on regulatory criteria, OCR selects a number of recipients each year for compliance reviews, audits that require recipients to aubmit data showing that they are providing services equitably to all segments of their service population and that their employment practices meet equal employment opportunity standards.

Complying with the Safe Streets Act or Program Requirements

In addition to these general prohibitions, an organization which is a recipient of fluancial assistance subject to the mondiscrimination provisions of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act (Safe Streets Act) of 1968, 42 U.S.C. § 3789d(c), or other Federal grant program requirements, must meet two additional requirements:(1) complying with Federal regulations pertaining to the development of an Equal Employment Opportunity Plan (EEOP), 28 C.F.R. § 42.301-.308, and (2) submitting to OCR Findings of Discrimination (see 28 C.F.R. §§ 42.205(5) or 31.202(5)).

1) Meeting the EEOP Requirement

In accordance with Federal regulations, Assarance No. 6 in the Standard Assurances, COPS Assurance No. 8.B, or certain Federal grant program requirements, your organization must comply with the following EEOF reporting requirements:

If your organization has received an award for \$500,000 or more and hus 50 or more employees (counting both full- and part-time employees but excluding political appointees), then it has to prepare an EEOP and salamit it to OCR for review within 60 days from the date of this letter. For assistance in developing an EEOP, please consult OCR's website at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/ecop.htm. You may also request technical assistance from an EEOP specialist at OCR by dialog (202) 616-3208.

If your organization received an award between \$25,000 and \$300,000 and has 50 or more employees, your organization still has to prepare an EEOP, but it does not have to submit the EEOP to OCR for review, instead, your organization has to maintain the EEOP on file and make it available for review on request. In addition, your organization has to complete Section B of the Certification Form and return it to OCR. The Certification Form can be found at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/ceop.htm

If your organization received an award for less than \$25,000; or if your organization has less than 50 employees, regardless of the amount of the award; or if your organization is a medical institution, educational institution, nonprofit organization or Indian tribe, then your organization is exempt from the EEOP requirement. However, your organization must complete Section A of the Certification Form and return is to QCR. The Certification Form can be found at http://www.ojp.ustloj.gov/ocr/eeop.htm.

2) Submitting Findings of Discrimination

In the event a Federal or State court or Federal or State administrative agency makes an adverse finding of discrimination against your organization after a due process hearing, on the ground of race, color, religion, national origin, or sex, your organization must submit a copy of the finding to CER for review.

Ensuring the Compliance of Subrecipients

If your organization makes subawards to other agencies, you are responsible for assuring that subrecipients also comply with all of the applicable Federal civil rights laws, including the requirements penaining to developing and submitting an EEOP, reporting Findings of Discrimination, and providing language services to LEP persons. State agencies that make aubawards grust have in place standard grant assurances and review procedures to demonstrate that they are effectively monitoring the civil rights compliance of subrecipients.

Categorical Exclusion for Lane County

The Edward Byrne Memorial Discretionary Grants Program helps local communities improve the capacity of local justice systems and provides for national support efforts. Awards under this program will be used to effectively plan, manage, and allocate resources to encourage information sharing to reduce the incidence of crime and drug abuse, to provide responsive law enforcement services to enhance local courts, and to enhance local corrections and offender recutry.

None of the following activities will be conducted whether under the Office of Justice Programs federal action or a related third party action:

- (1) New construction.
- (2) Renovation or remodeling of a property either (a) listed on or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places or (b) located within a 100-year flood plain.
- (3) A renovation which will change the basic prior use of a facility or significantly change its size.
- (4) Research and technology whose anticipated and future application could be expected to have an effect on the environment.
- (5) Implementation of a program involving the use of chemicals.

Consequently, the subject federal action meets the Office of Justice Programs' criteria for a categorical exclusion as contained in paragraph 4(b) of Appendix D to Part 61 of the Code of Federal Regulations. Additionally, the proposed action is neither a phase nor a segment of a project which when reviewed in its entirety would not meet the criteria for a categorical exclusion.



The Congressionally Recommended Awards Program, authorized by the Department of Justice Appropriations Act, 2010 (Pub. L. 111-117), helps improve the functioning of the criminal justice system, prevent or combat juvenile delinquency, and/or assist victims of crime (other than compensation). Funds should be used for the projects recommended by Congress, in the amounts specified in the joint explanatory statement incorporated by reference into Pub. L. 111-117, and generally consistent with one or more of the following statutory purposes: improving the functioning of the criminal justice system, preventing or combating juvenile delinquency, or assisting victims of crime (other than compensation). Each of these purposes is framed using language drawn, respectively, from the former Byrne discretionary statute, the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act, the Victims of Crime Act, and the Violence Against Women Act. This project is authorized and funded through a line item in the FY 2010 Congressional Budget and by the joint explanatory statement that is incorporated by reference into the FY2010 Department of Justice Appropriations Act.
