I. MOTION

ORDER _____ / In the Matter of Appointing Seven Members to the Mental Health Advisory/Local Alcohol and Drug Planning Committee and One Member to the Human Services Commission Community Action Advisory Committee.

II. AGENDA ITEM SUMMARY

The Mental Health Advisory/Local Alcohol and Drug Planning Committee (MHAC/LADPC) LM3.524 seeks to fill seven positions and the Human Services Commission (HSC) Community Action Advisory Committee (CAAC) seeks to fill one vacancy.

III. BACKGROUND/IMPLICATIONS OF ACTION

A. Board Action and Other History

The Mental Health Advisory/Local Alcohol and Drug Planning Committee is a body that is mandated by state rule to be appointed by the board of county commissioners. The role of the MHAC/LADPC is to advise the board of county commissioners in identifying needs and establishing priorities for alcoholism services; to determine the need for local mental health services and adopt a comprehensive local plan for the delivery of mental health services; as well as to advise the local mental health authority and community mental health and developmental disability program director on community needs and priorities for services.

There are seven positions in this committee that must be appointed. These were created by the resignation of two members, the term expirations of four members and one representative of the Mental Health Consumer Council that must be appointed. The Consumer Council representative was added to the membership cadre when the bylaws and Lane Manual definition were revised in 2009. This occurred through a process between the Consumer Council and the MHAC/LADPC after both parties agreed that the Council needed

a designated representative to this body. Mr. Bruce was elected by the consumer council to be their representative and attended the MHAC/LADPC meetings during the 2007-08 year as an informal representative of the council. Then, in July 2009 he was recognized as a voting member of the MHAC/LADPC. A recent review of committee records discovered that Mr. Bruce's membership was never presented to the Board of County Commissioners for approval. This order seeks to correct that oversight.

The vacancy notice for the other six positions was advertised from June 4, 2010 through July 9, 2010. At the close of the advertising period, ten applications were received. Eight applications were new and two applications were for reappointment

The MHAC/LADPC convened a subcommittee and conducted interviews of nine of the applicants. One person, Francisca Levya-Johnson, phoned to withdraw just prior to her interview. Judith Voss, e-mailed a request, after her interview, to have her application for membership withdrawn from consideration. Ms. Deborah Karin Stotler was appointed to this committee on October 20, 2009 to complete a partial term and is applying for her first four-year term. Michael Leeds was appointed to this committee on June 11, 2008 to complete a partial term and is applying for his first four-year term. All of the candidates listed below have extensive backgrounds in alcohol/drug abuse treatment systems and/or developmental disabilities support systems and/or mental health treatment/support systems. Oregon Administrative Rule and the Lane Manual require that "members of the committee must include a number of minority members to reasonably reflect the proportion of need for minority services in the community." While we do not have an estimate of this need, the 2008 census found that 6.5 percent of the Lane County population identified themselves as Hispanic. Mr. Mario Petersen identifies himself as an individual with a Latin cultural background. He was born, raised and educated in Argentina. As such he is able to represent the 6.5 percent of the Lane County population who identified themselves as Hispanic according to the 2008 census. Mr. Petersen's membership represents 8.3 percent of the body of members. Mr. Brandon Chambers is a high-school senior and, if appointed, will be the first youth representative on this body.

The MHAC/LADPC is a state mandated committee with requirements specific to the individuals who may populate the membership. Therefore, the Lane Manual requirement regarding commissioner appointments does not apply (this was verified with Legal Counsel) and all positions are community at-large. Therefore, the MHAC/LADPC recommends the individuals listed below for appointment and reappointment.

The board of county commissioners last took action to appoint members to this advisory committee on October 22, 2009. A list of the present membership is attached to this agenda packet.

The Community Action Advisory Committee has designated slots for recruitment within the mandated tripartite advisory board structure (ORS 458.505). The role of the CAAC is to advise the board of county commissioners on the emergency basic needs and community action service systems to address the needs of low-income citizens of Lane County.

The Lane Manual allows for twelve members of which a third are public officials currently serving or their designees, at least a third of the members represent low-income persons in Lane County and the balance (At-large) represent business, industry, labor, religious, welfare, education or other major groups of interest in the community (LM 3.530).

There is one vacancy on this body created by the term expiration of an At-large community representative.

At the close of the advertising period from April 5, 2010 to June 30, 2010 one application had been received. The Community Action Advisory Committee recommended that individual, Korrin Bishop, as the candidate to forward to the Board of Commissioners for consideration.

The board of county commissioners last took action to appoint members to this advisory committee on May 5, 2010 (bo 10-05-05-03). A list of the present membership is attached to this agenda packet.

B. Policy Issues

The nominees meet and exceed the minimum qualifications for service on these advisory committees.

The MHAC/LADPC will gain seven members; one representing the Consumer Council, one representing a completion of term for a member who resigned, three who will be new to the committee, and two initiating a first 4-year term.

The CAAC will gain a new member to complete the roster of 12. The nominee meets the minimum qualifications for service on this body. The Human Services Commission's Manager and Supervisor collaborated with the Community Action Advisory Committee in assessing the qualifications of the candidate.

C. Board Goals

These appointments meet the Board's objective of encouraging citizen participation.

D. Financial and/or Resource Considerations

H&HS is very reliant on advisory committees and the pool of applicants, possessing the specialized needs required to adequately fill these committees. Recruitment for committees represents a significant, ongoing expense for the department.

E. Analysis

Advisory committee members assumed the responsibility of selecting the best individuals to meet the needs of the committee. The nominees' applications have been carefully reviewed and the individuals have been interviewed by committee members to assess applicants' background, knowledge and interest in applying their efforts to the tasks of the advisory committees.

F. Alternatives/Options

1. Appoint the seven nominees to the Mental Health Advisory/Local Alcohol and Drug Planning Committee and appoint the single nominee to the Community Action Advisory Committee.
2. Re-advertise and reopen the vacancies for one or both of the advisory committees.

IV. RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommend adoption of option one above.

V. TIMING/IMPLEMENTATION

The seven nominees will become members of the Mental Health Advisory/Local Alcohol and Drug Planning Committee and the single nominee will become a member of the Community Action Advisory Committee upon Board approval.

VI. FOLLOW-UP

Board approval being received for this appointment, the department will create notification letters for both appointment and non-appointment of the applicants to the advisory committee (as appropriate) and forward to the county administrator for signature. New members will be invited to attend the September meeting of the MHAC/LADPC and the new member of the CAAC will be invited to the September meeting for an orientation to the Community Action Advisory Committee and its budgetary charge.
